Jack became a regular chauffeur for a while! Wonderful gifts from a wonderful family of coworkers.

In any new community there are those moments when it feels surprising that life happens to its members no differently than to any other community. Babies are born, people fall in love, families come together or fall apart, and people die. Alice was not the first of our young community to pass on. But she is the first "inner circle" active member, and always our most enthusiastic evangelist.

Alice did share a first for our community, however. She and Bruce Carter were the first couple to find each other here. I am so honored to know that we all played a part in creating an environment that nurtured a young love with two people who really deserved it. Seven months. That's what they got to have together, of active happy times. I just got off the phone with Bruce, and his words... "oh, it was so much better than good." Bruce stayed incredibly devoted to Alice throughout her illness. He is hurting, and also very appreciative for what they had.

And I take great pleasure in knowing that her deep dive into steampunk artistry was a direct outcome of my connecting with her and sharing some of that enthusiasm.
